

EARLY LIFE AND EDUCATION

Abusuapayin Inspector (Rtd.) Seth Amoako Boakye, affectionately known as “Mamonta,” “Akora,” or “Inspector Boakye.” was born on August 4, 1942, in the peaceful town of Begoro, located in the Fanteakwa District of Ghana’s Eastern Region. He was the youngest child of the late Oheneba Kofi Boakye and Alice Akua Temah, both proud natives of Begoro. He began his education at the Salvation Army Primary School in Begoro. In 1957, his father relocated him to Dunkwa, where he continued his studies at the Dunkwa Presbyterian Primary School. He completed Form 4 in 1962 and was admitted to Boampensem Secondary School in Dunkwa-On-Offin, situated in the Upper Denkyira East District of Ghana’s Central Region, where he pursued technical studies.

However, his path was not without hardship. A difficult relationship with his father led to estrangement and ultimately forced him to leave school prematurely in 1964. Despite this setback, he faced life head-on and began working as a driver; a role that marked the beginning of his journey into public service and community leadership.

CAREER IN THE GHANA POLICE SERVICE

On June 15, 1967, he joined the Ghana Police Service at the Accra Depot. He graduated in 1970, and was posted to Tema Community 2 as his first station. Over the years, he served in various parts of the country; Old Ningo in 1974, Navrongo and Bolgatanga in 1976, Kumasi Mankranso in 1984, and finally Akim Oda in 1988, where he served for 18 years. He retired on August 4, 2005, after 38 years of dedicated service to the nation. After retirement, he returned to Begoro to enjoy a well-earned rest in his hometown.



FAMILY AND FAITH

On August 25, 1980, he married the late Janet Ofosuaa, who also came from Begoro. Before their marriage, each of them had one child: Alfred Antwi Amoako (his son) and Richard Otchere Mintah (her son). Together, they were blessed with four more children - two daughters, Irene Boa Amoako and Evelyn Tima Amoako, and two sons, Patrick Okyere Amoako and Enoch Kyei Amoako.

He also briefly cared for Romeo Kwadwo Apori, after Romeo lost his mother, (the late Janet Ofosuaa's only sister) at a young age. Romeo later relocated to live with his father in Tema. In all, our father had seven children, each of whom he loved dearly and raised with care. The Lord also blessed him with 20 grandchildren, who brought him great joy and pride.

In 1998, he was baptised by Pastor S. A. Asiamah (now Evangelist Rtd.) of the Church of Pentecost in Akim Oda and became a committed member of the church. Before that, he worshipped as a Presbyterian.

Our father valued education and Christian principles deeply. He made sure that all his children, and anyone under his care, was raised with discipline, good morals, and strong faith. He believed in training us to be responsible, respectful, and God-fearing individuals.

Back in Begoro, he served as the Abusuapayin (family head) of the Amofu Aduana Family, a role he carried with honour and wisdom.

FINAL DAYS AND LEGACY

He complained of a slight ailment and therefore sought medical attention at Begoro District Hospital on Thursday, 28th day of August 2025. In the early hours of Friday August 29, 2025, God called him home. His passing was sudden and unexpected, but we are thankful for the full and meaningful life he lived.

We will always remember him for his love, discipline, generosity, and kindness. His legacy lives on in us, and his memory will forever remain in our hearts.

We never imagined that your departure would come so soon. Even in your advanced years, we hoped for more time with you. Time for you to enjoy the fruits of your labour, time for us to continue sharing life with you. The loss of our dear mother fourteen years ago left a deep void, and now you too, have left us; quietly, without farewell.

Akora, as we affectionally called our father, was both father and mother to us. His love was unwavering, his presence, constant. He stood by us through every season, offering comfort, strength, and wisdom. The news of his passing came like a sudden storm, leaving us shaken and heartbroken.

How do we tell our story now, when the storyteller is no longer here to guide us? He was our compass, our advisor, our encourager, our inspiration. Together with our mother, he laid a firm foundation for our lives, one built on discipline, responsibility and faith.

You raised us with care and conviction. You taught us to be strong, to work hard, and to walk with integrity. We saw the sacrifices you made, how you laboured to meet our needs, to ensure we lacked nothing essential. You shielded us from hardship, and in doing so, you shaped us into the people we are today.

We remember how you put us in charge of caring for poultry and livestock. That simple responsibility taught us accountability and leadership from a young age.

It wasn't just about feeding animals, it was about learning to show up, to be dependable, and to take pride in our duties.

You also created a reward system that made our small victories feel monumental. Whether it was earning first position in class or mastering how to read an analogue watch, you celebrated our wins with thoughtful gifts; i.e. buying our very first watches or ensuring we had new clothes for Christmas and other festive occasions. These gestures made us feel seen, valued, and motivated to strive for more.

Through your example, we learned resilience, determination, and the value of honest labour. Alongside our mother, you instilled in us virtues of love, hard work, humility, kindness, and respect. You corrected us when we strayed by not sparing the rod, and though we may not have understood it then, we now know it was all rooted in love. A love that sought to mould us into responsible adults who would make you proud.

We will miss your gentle check-ins, your wise counsel, and the sense of security your presence always brought. You were a model of fatherhood; one we aspire to emulate as we raise our own families in unity and love.

We remember your words after our mother passed: "If I could, I would have taken her place." That selflessness defined you.






Thank you, Akora, for everything; for the sacrifices, the lessons, the laughter, and the love. We pray that the Lord, whom you served faithfully rewards you.

Sleep well, Grandpa.


